CCSD announces selection of key leader to focus on student equity providing schools with more autonomy
Changes are part of the district's ongoing reorganization

LAS VEGAS – As part of the ongoing reorganization of the Clark County School District (CCSD) to provide autonomy to schools, Superintendent Pat Skorkowsky has announced the hiring of Dr. Greta Peay as the chief instructional services officer.

Peay joined CCSD in 1987 after working in the Charlotte-Macklenburg School System as an elementary and middle school teacher and principal. Peay then served in CCSD as a teacher, literacy and English Language Learner specialist, regional trainer, and a variety of central office positions. She has served as the director of Equity and Diversity Education (EDE) Department for the past seven years.

In her new capacity, Peay will continue to oversee EDE, and she will also serve as the liaison to the superintendent for the Transfer of Responsibilities Working Group, which is examining how the district can give schools more autonomy. She will also work on issues of disproportionality to ensure equity for all students in the district.

“I am thrilled that Dr. Greta Peay has accepted the position of chief instructional services officer to help oversee the continued effort to provide schools with more autonomy and to ensure that all students have the opportunity to succeed at CCSD,” said Skorkowsky. “Dr. Peay has been an outstanding leader for the district and she and her staff in Equity and Diversity have done a tremendous job of moving CCSD forward in areas of cultural understanding and bullying.”

Skorkowsky also praised Peay for being known locally and nationally for her professional development skills to educate others about best practices in the areas of literacy, language acquisition, differentiated instruction and cultural competency.

“I would like to thank Superintendent Skorkowsky for this opportunity and I am looking forward to continuing to serve the district in a new role, to advocate for every student to receive equitable educational opportunities,” said Peay.

Peay began her new duties on July 24.
