CCSD reminds undocumented immigrants of no-reporting policy

District reassures students and families that their privacy will be protected

LAS VEGAS – In light of recent national news involving Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA), the Clark County School District (CCSD) is reminding families that CCSD schools are safe places for undocumented students. Founded by the Obama administration in June 2012, DACA is an immigration policy that allows certain undocumented immigrants who entered the country as minors to receive a renewable two-year period of deferred action from deportation, as well as eligibility for a work permit.

CCSD Trustee Carolyn Edwards said, "We don't report undocumented immigrants to authorities. The end of DACA would not affect the education of undocumented students in CCSD."

On Jan. 26, 2017, the CCSD Board of School Trustees approved a resolution that reinforced the district's commitment to students regardless of immigration status. During the Jan. 26 meeting, Trustee Edwards explained that the Board of Trustees was reaffirming that they will continue to follow the current federal policy for immigration status for students.

The resolution aimed to raise awareness of the federal policy and reassure students and families that their privacy would continue to be protected and that all students would continue to receive a quality education.
