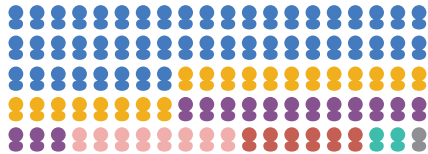

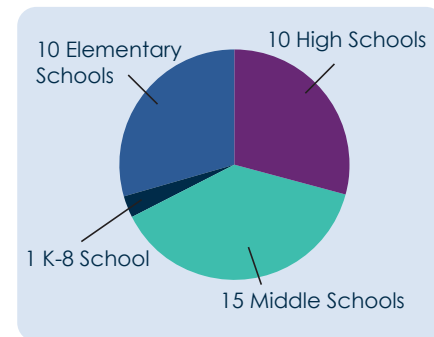

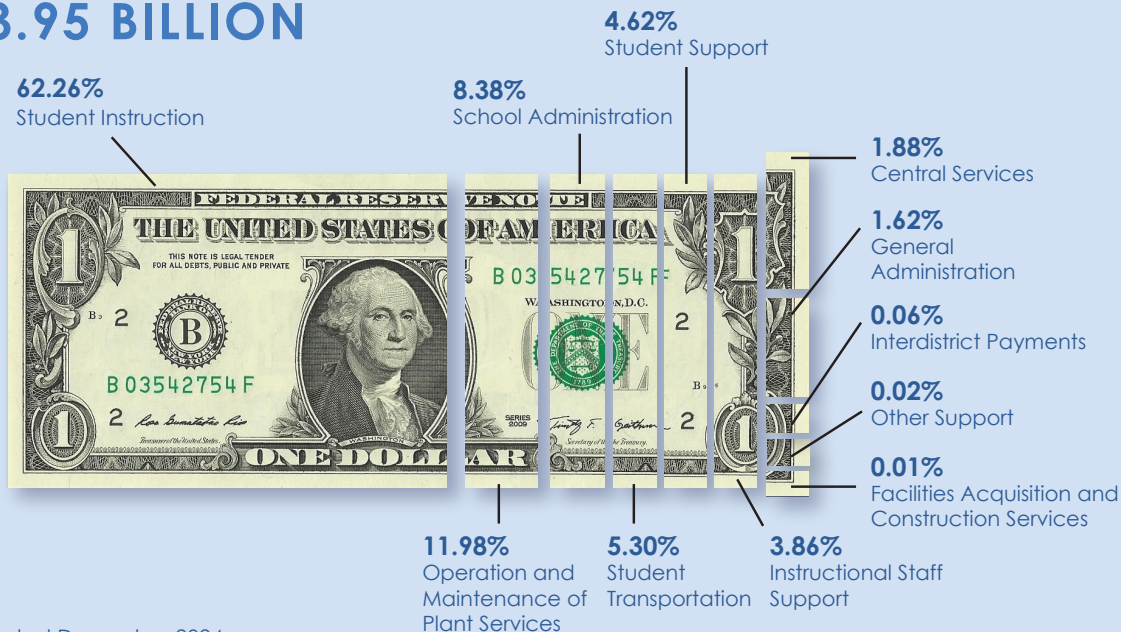

A bond or credit rating is given to the debt obligations of the District as assigned by nationally recognized statistical rating organizations. The letter designation represents the quality of the bonds.

The benefits of having a strong bond rating are lower interest costs when issuing bonds since investors often base part of their decision to buy bonds on the credit rating of the debt.

ACHIEVEMENTS
